Modern Foreign Languages — Barcelona Trip



On Tuesday 28th June we took a group of very excited Year 10s to Barcelona for what was our first trip abroad post-Covid. As always, our students were an absolute credit to themselves and the Academy and our guide, Danni, even said that they were the best group that he had ever had!

During the visit we did a great deal of sightseeing and experienced lots of the Spanish culture. This included a visit to a 4D cinema to find out about the famous architect Antoni Gaudi, which was a lot of fun. After, we visited Parc Guell and La Sagrada Familia, both designed and built by Gaudi himself. We also visited Barcelona Aquarium, had a walking tour of the Gothic Quarter and did Tapas tasting at a Flamenco show, where some of our students even had an opportunity to put on their dancing shoes! There was also plenty of opportunity for shopping and eating and getting the hang of travelling by metro!

The highlight for lots of the students was the evening spent at Placa de Espanya, where we experienced the fountains and light show, which was set to music. After four days and 43 miles walking, we arrived home in the early hours of Sunday morning; exhausted but happy!





Modern Foreign Languages Department—Ole Ole Visit

Year 8 Spanish students were lucky enough to enjoy an authentic Spanish experience without the long journey to Spain when 90 of them were taken for tapas tasting at Olé Olé Tapas Restaurant in Lincoln. Students tasted a range of tapas dishes, including patatas locas, albondigas, croquetas de pollo, paella vegetarian and, to the delight of everyone involved, churros dipped in chocolate. There were many happy and chocolatey faces by the end of the visit!

Most dishes were entirely new to the majority of students and we were pleased to see so many empty plates! Pan con ali-oli was a particular hit, being devoured within minutes of it being served!

Students had the opportunity to practise their knowledge of Spanish by conversing

with waiting staff and were able to thank the chefs in Spanish when they finished their meal. "Es delicioso" was a frequently heard comment and I am sure that there will be many students who are keen to take their parents back to Olé Olé in the future!

This term, Year 7 French students are discovering the Tour de France, whilst Year 9 are learning about the origins of France's national holiday, Bastille Day.






Year 8 Spanish students are learning about Spanish architect Gaudí and will be designing their own Gaudí-esque buildings.





English Department

It has been a typically busy final term in the English department. We thoroughly enjoyed seeing our new Year 7s for their Year 6 transition lessons. All of the Year 6 students coming to SRPA in September have received their transition boxes which contained, amongst other things, their own copy of the book *Twelve Minutes to Midnight* by Christopher Edge. Some of the students had already read the book before their visit to the English department during the transition days which we were very impressed by! For others, they received an introduction to the book in their first English lesson at SRPA which focused on the Victorian gothic comics called 'penny dreadful'. Students had fun creating their own penny dreadful



front covers and showed us that we have plenty of imaginative and talented writers to look forward to teaching in September.

At the other end of the Academy, we had a fantastic Year 12 transition day in the English department. We welcomed over twenty five students to our transition lessons for A Levels in English Language and English Literature, where students were given an insight into the two courses and a brief look at the exciting opportunities available to them when they begin their A Level English study in September.

Mr Chetwynd took the current Y12 A Level English Language group to Bishop Grosseteste university during term 6, to take part in an English Language masterclass, focusing on the question: Does your accent make you sound smarter? Accents always get people talking, whether it's whose accent sounds most attractive (Scottish accents have been voted top this year), how convincing actors' accents are in films, or when someone changes the way they speak (think about your telephone voice). The masterclass invited students to consider whether anyone has ever made assumptions about them based on their accent, and how attitudes to accent can affect how intelligent, authoritative, or friendly someone is perceived to be. The class enjoyed the day and found it informative and interesting. We hope to be able to take more groups of students to enjoy these masterclass events next year, when the A Level in English Literature is up and running.



What's available in the library

Not only do we have a wide range of fiction, our updated non-fiction section continues to prove popular, as do the frequently updated stock of newspapers and magazines covering a range of topics. One of our broadening provisions are MFL magazines – students can immerse themselves in the language they are learning by reading about the latest news in Spanish or French.







Students in Key Stage 3 have a library lesson once a fortnight as part of their English curriculum time so all have plenty of opportunity to borrow books and read. Students work on literary booklets designed by our reading lead, answering questions on extracts from popular titles such as *Enola Holmes*, *Wonder*, *Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time* and many more, to promote a curiosity about a range of books and provide a diverse reading experience. Other students use Accelerated Reader to help target development of reading for understanding by having students recall the knowledge they have gained from their book before completing a quiz using Accelerated Reader.

Our policy at SRPA is that all students need to have a book with them every day, either from home or from our library. Our setting supports every student to be able to say: 'I am a reader'



The Art, Photography and Technology department has had a very busy year and we want to congratulate all of our artists, technologists and photographers for their hard work. We have challenged our students in term 5 with Whirlpool competition prep, GCSE exhibition and food showcase and finally inspiring others with outstanding outcomes.



Curriculum Delivery

Students have worked hard exploring all the new materials, techniques and tools set before them. We have seen a growth in understanding of different workshop and artroom practices and we are proud of all your hard work

Within Art, our Year 7 artists have been developing their knowledge of using 3D



media and have explored using clay and acrylic to paint them. They have learnt how to shape and mould clay to make a realistic 3D show. They have explored different techniques to apply texture and have ended the year painting their clay shoes so they look realistic.

Year 8 have been expanding their knowledge of Pop Art through creating a 3D can out of cardboard, PVA glue and paper mache. Some groups have been trailing a new scheme of learning of gargoyle creature creation and have ended their term making imps and gargoyles out of clay.

Our Year 9s have had the opportunity to create work inspired by food and drink. They have worked on the grid method to improve their accuracy, watercolour recreations and finally exploring four different media in one experiment to enhance their understanding of creating a final piece.

Our GCSE Year 10 artists and photographers have begun their coursework projects. Given five different titles, students have begun to produce a portfolio in response to the title. They have started by producing mind maps from initial research and taken photographs that are associated with their topic title. Our Year 11 artists and photographers have finished their GCSE journey with us and have submitted their portfolios for assessment and moderation. We are extremely proud of all our GCSE creators and we hope to see them continue on to our A-Level programme.





Year 7 Design and Technology students have focused on developing their understanding of metals, health and safety in the workshops and workshop tools by exploring fabrication. They have worked on expanding their knowledge of plastics by creating key rings that have been glued, cut and filled using various workshop tools. By understanding the basic health and safety measures implemented in the practical

classrooms, students have been able to safely explore the different machines we have available in Technology.

Year 8s have focused on where metals come from, different types of metals and how they react with other elements. They have worked with ferrous and non-

ferrous materials exploring the forming cutting, drilling and involved metal processes in Year 9 manipulation. have been metal working on processing, investigating workshop casting and comparing against industrial casting. their They have developed



understanding and knowledge of computer-aided design and computer aided manufacture.



Year 10 Design and Technology students been given different starting points for their coursework and they have begun to build a portfolio of research in response to their chosen title. During their lessons, the Year 10 students are expanding their deeper knowledge of metals by exploring the same practical sessions as KS3 but with more of a focus on the theory behind the material and practical skills. Year 10 have also completed their

mock examinations to test their current knowledge and identify areas of strength and areas for improvement. All the creators within Design and Technology have worked hard exploring the various tools, machines and processes involved in the practical based lessons.

Students learnt about his school life, experiences and lifestyle choices that guided him into his current job role as lead guitar designer. They were given a tour of the workshop studio showing the



process of designing bespoke rock legends guitars. Our students worked hard designing their own guitars inspired by music artist they listen to and follow. Fifteen students have been selected for a further competition for the chance to win a signed back stage pass from Matt Bellamy on behalf of Manson's Guitars. These students were given their designs back to complete and they have all emailed to Manson's Guitars to select a winner.



Year 6 Transition Week

Art and Technology have welcomed the new students of SRPA as they took part in the Year 6 transition days. We had a Year 6 lessons taking place across the whole department. From mono printing cards to decorating biscuit shields.





In Art and Technology, students explored a printing technique that developing their understanding of writing lettering backwards so it prints the correct way round. They worked with block inks, rolled it, printed and signed off their cards to their primary teachers. In Food Technology students were

given food colouring and icing and were tasked to create our house colours



and school badge out of icing.

CIPFA Management Games

The CIPFA Management was fun a environment for post-16 students to sample the scope, complexity and impact of financial management in the public sector. We were given background information about the local council. Each student took on a role such as chief executive, director of finance, director of housing. Students produced a draft report which had a tight deadline.



As life is not always straightforward, interruptions were thrown in and each team had to decide how to handle these while completing the main task. After lunch the teams receive a "bombshell" and had to revise their plans, with further interruptions to add that extra sense of reality. Finally they delivered a presentation to the panel of industry experts with their decisions and recommendations.



This was a fantastic opportunity for our students to develop key skills and give them a real taste of working life. Our students were so enthusiastic and enjoyed the whole experience. Visit to Bishop Grosseteste University

Year 12 Business Studies students visited Bishop Grosseteste University to provide an insight into studying Business Studies at undergraduate level. The session involved an introduction to practical approaches to leadership, discussing the strengths and weaknesses of different leadership styles to help students determine their leadership style!

<u>Year 10 Business and Enterprise – Perfecta Pizza!</u>

Our two Year 10 Business and Enterprise groups have put their learning into practice by making pizzas! As part of their coursework, students had to work to the brief of designing a new pizza menu for Perfect Pizza. As part of this, they were required to research what pizzas their target audience would like. Market research methods were used to gather this information and the students then analysed their findings and produced three pizza

designs based on this information. Students created a second questionnaire to find out what their target audience thought about their pizza designs. This fed into students

being able to create a final pizza design using the strengths and weakness identified from the second piece of market research.

Students were delighted to be able to team up with the Technology department to be able to make their final pizza design. In this

lesson Mr Palethorpe discussed aesthetics, mass production and the quality of the pizza. It was also a great opportunity for students to

practice and develop their cooking skills!







Humanities Department - Geography

The Geography department have been continuing to update our Key Stage 3 curriculum since Easter we have taught year 7 Flooding and the new Rainforests

topic. Year 8 have learnt about the geography of crime and most recently our new glaciation topic, learning how ice shapes the earth.


Year 9 learnt geographical enquiry skills and to finish off the key stage they are revisiting some of the topics from the last 3 years exploring the geography behind the current news headlines.



Year 10 geographers are coming towards the half way mark of their course. Having learnt about the coastal landscapes of the UK they are now focusing on the UK's river landscapes.

Sixth form geography students continue to make great progress. Year 12 geographers have completed their hazards topic and are coming towards the end of the changing places topic. They have completed two field trips. The first one to Hornsea on the Holderness coast, where they put their physical fieldwork skills to the test, measuring the beach profile and evaluating the effectiveness of the coastal management strategies.

Sun, sand and ice-cream was enjoyed by all!



The second trip took us to Whisby Nature Park to investigate the earth systems of the water and carbon cycle. We measured trees to calculate how much carbon is stored in them before investigating different infiltration rates and how they vary across the park. This was followed by an afternoon in Abbey

Ward investigating how the life experience of people has changed over time.


Personal Development Day

Sixth form students followed a separate programme covering independent living skills and took part in an afternoon at Lincoln Bowl as a stress buster activity.











Attitude to Learning (A2L)

At Sir Robert Pattinson Academy, we run a highly successful Attitudes to Learning Programme designed to support our pupils to achieve their very best. The programme has the following aims:

To drive engagement, aspiration, goals and resilience

To encourage pupils to be more engaged with their learning, have a thirst and curiosity to know more, do more and be more.

The A2L programme centres on developing and instilling 5 key attributes within our pupils. These are; willingness to learn, resilience, motivation/determination, teamwork and the ability to reflect. We believe these attributes are crucial in ensuring good behaviour and maximising progress for our pupils. Each term, subject teachers will complete an A2L Assessment. They will make a judgement based on pupil A2L and grade then as one of 4 types of learner - Expert, Highly Effective, Effective or Developing.

Expert learners are taking responsibility for their education and beyond. Becoming an expert learner is an outstanding achievement.

Highly Effective learners have a few target areas to work upon to become an expert learner but are showing many of the qualities needed to succeed.

Effective learners have a mixture of positive attitudes and a number to work upon.

Developing learners need to address a number of areas but have the potential to improve with all of the support available.

Following an A2L assessment, pupils will complete an A2L review as part of the R2L tutor programme. This can be seen in the pupil planner. Pupils will note their grades and set themselves targets to improve.

Pupils who have been graded overall as a Developing Learner or those that we feel are at risk of becoming a Developing Learner, will begin the *A2L Booster* intervention programme with the aim of improving their attitude towards learning. Pupils on this programme will receive a letter home informing parents and will begin a Booster report, which is led by the R2L tutor and monitored by the House team. Pupils with the greatest need will also receive mentoring from a member of staff who will work with them to improve their A2L. Pupils who are successful and improve their A2L grade will complete the programme. Those who are not will receive further intervention and support.

We are incredibly proud of our Expert Learners and see this as the benchmark that all pupils should aspire to reach. Expert Learners will be recognised and rewarded at different points throughout the year and those who show they are consistently an Expert Learner will receive an Expert Learner badge from the Head Teacher.

We are incredibly proud of how well our pupils have engaged with the Academy's A2L programme so far this year. Parental support is a key factor in the success of the A2L programme and is always greatly appreciated.
