#### **Modern Foreign Languages**



Our two teams represented Spanish-speaking football teams in the event, from Uruguay and Argentina.

They demonstrated their excellent Spanish skills by preparing for and then interviewing a football journalist in Spanish, as well as interviewing a football manager in Spanish.



The pupils learned something about the organisation involved in hosting a football team from another country and listened to a speech by the multilingual former footballer and current academy coach of Burnley Football Club, Pierce Kiembé. Pierce impressed upon the pupils the advantages of multilingualism in the world of sport, in particular in football and pupils were surprised to learn how many roles required the use of foreign languages.

Finally pupils were able to meet two multilingual members of Lincoln City's squad, Lewis Montsma and Lasse Sørensen. This was clearly the highlight of the day! Our pupils were a credit to the Academy and we were very proud to see one of our teams achieve 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the competition!







#### **Modern Foreign Languages Department**

In November, 24 of our pupils took part in GCHQ's National Languages Competition.



A set of highly determined pupils worked incredibly hard to solve a number of extremely difficult linguistic puzzles, many of them using languages they had never seen before, such as

Afrikaans and Greek!





Pupils put their knowledge of languages into practice to find the answers to these puzzles, showing that they have the linguistic ability to help GCHQ in their mission to keep the nation safe.



As you know, GCHQ recruits highly capable linguists to work with them in the constant battle to defend our country from attack, with Russian linguists being especially highly sought after at the moment, for obvious reasons! No doubt some of our fabulous linguists have shown that they have what it takes to join the recruits in years to come!



#### **English Department**




The year has started in typically busy fashion in the English department. We have enjoyed getting to know our new year 7 pupils and started our study of the transition novel 'Twelve Minutes to Midnight' straight after October half term. We are looking forward to cultural capital week in the final week of this term where our focus will be the Victorian era – there will be lots of opportunities to make links to 'Twelve Minutes...' which is set in Victorian London.

We have been especially impressed with our year 9 pupils as they finished their unit on great leaders by writing and delivering their own speeches to their class.

These speeches form the first part of the pupils' GCSE English Language quali-

fication and pupils have risen to the challenge brilliantly, presenting impressive speeches on a huge variety of topics such as: why fast fashion is wrong; why guide dogs are important to society; whether the current Conservative government is the most disastrous in recent history; and how important the England women's win at the Euros was for the growth of the women's game. It is always a nerve-wracking time for pupils as they are required to deliver their speech in front of an audience with speeches being video recorded as part of the exam board's moderation requirements, so it is always pleasing to see pupils encouraging each other, listening respectfully and helping each other by asking questions at the end of each speech to give each pupil the opportunity to maximise their marks.

Year 11 have benefitted from a series of masterclasses on the full range of GCSE Literature topics this term. Masterclasses have been staffed by all the department's teachers and have been well attended, with each masterclass working towards giving pupils all they need to answer a question based on a set text. Pupils who have attended can now approach questions such as 'How does Stevenson present Mr Hyde as a terrifying figure?', 'How is Mr Scrooge shown as a character who is willing to change?' and 'How is power presented in *Ozymandias* and *My Last Duchess*?' with a new confidence. In addition, we are looking forward to taking 125 year 11 pupils to the Theatre Royal in Nottingham in January to see the GCSE Literature text, *An Inspector Calls*, in performance. This is a great opportunity to enjoy this fantastic production from the National Theatre and we're so pleased that so many of our pupils have signed up to attend.






#### **English Department**

The Art, Photography and Technology department has had a great start to our first term, and we have had the wonderful opportunity to display all the different talents we have here within the Academy. We have challenged our pupils with Springboard Food competitions, multi-media experimentation, Open evening, subject champion selection and developing their knowledge of technology through invention.

#### **Curriculum Delivery**

As we have settled back into a normal routine after our summer break our creators have been working hard in both the practical elements of our department and expanding their knowledge and understanding. Our schemes of learning have been updated in both Art and Technology to reflect

the ever-changing world of creators around us.

Within art, our Year 7 artists have been focusing on exploring the formal elements in a booklet form. They have learnt how to begin to understand shape and form through drawing their owns shoes. They have then experimented with colour by working with mixed media on a shoe design. Pupils have been challenged from the getgo with their first homework focusing on who inspires them as an artist. The homework we have received are of a high standard and some of the artists they have chosen show are very non-traditional and this shows how differently our pupils are beginning to explore art.





Our Year 7 Technologists have been focusing on exploring their understanding of health and safety within the workshop. They have then taken this knowledge and applied it whilst exploring wood types, cutting and adhesion processes to create their own pen pots. Within Food and Nutrition Year 7 are developing their knife skills, learning how to use a peeler and how to correctly dice an onion making crudites for their first practical, spicy tomato soup and apple crumble. This will also start

their journey in learning how to use a hob and oven safely. Alongside this they have been learning about the Eatwell Guide and the different nutrients our body needs. As an important factor of the course pupils

have been asked to evaluate each practical for their homework to reflect on their skills and where they can improve.

Year 8 have been expanding their knowledge of Pop Art and have created exciting pieces inspired by a modern artist and been using a gouache in their artwork to expand their media knowledge to further prepare them for GCSE Art. They have focused on making sure their drawings are the correct proportion and use colours that are relevant to the Pop Art movement. Within Technology our Year 8's have been exploring the Arts



and Crafts Art design movement by designing their own coaster inspired by the style of the period. They have developed their understanding, knowledge and application of computer aided design and computer aided manufacture by creating coasters inspired by the movement.



Our Food Technologists are learning about the importance of controlling portion size when making mini frittata's and carrot cake muffins and how this can affect how a product cooks, demonstrates the importance of preheating an oven and timings. They have been learning about choices people make when it comes tour diet and what might influence this. From this, pupils are asked to evaluate their practical work as homework and a further task is to watch a video on serving techniques and use this information to present an evening meal at home a la carte style and take a photo.

Our Year 9's have had the exciting challenge of recreating food and drink in a multi-media format. They

have worked on recreating cans and

sweet wrappers in four different media on one piece focusing on how each media works and exploring colour within each media. Moving forward, they are then going to work on creating their favourite food and drink items out of clay and painting them to


make them a piece of artwork that is both creative and 3D.

Within GCSE Art and Design, pupils have focused on developing their markmaking skills using non-tradition techniques of working in coffee, tea, inks

with forks and stick drawing. By working on the topic of natural forms, they have been able to explore different media in objects commonly found in their everyday life. They began the year focusing on developing the quality of their drawing skills by developing their confidence in working in multi-media art processes by completing varied observational tasks using pencil, pen and charcoal.

A-level Artists have

been experimenting with mark making by working on drawing the human form in a way that removes the perfection expected when working on portraiture. They focused on completing smaller drawings in small time slots to focus on their application and form, not on the perfect shape expected when working with the human form. By working in this way, we are challenging our artists to explore more mark making and draw what is there and not what is perceived.









Within our development of the schemes of learning we have introduced careers in our starters to ensure pupils understand where the lesson could take them. We want pupils to make links to the knowledge or skill developed in the lesson allows them to take many different pathways in their future careers that are not only in our subjects but in many different subjects across the academy.



#### **Pupil Experience**

Over the last term, pupils completed an application form to become one of our subject champions and Miss Hett met with our team of champions to thank them for their hard work supporting with after school events such as open evening and options evening. Our subject champions are working hard behind the scenes designing engaging extra-curricular clubs for all of our pupils. Our champions are set to meet again in December to come up with new and exciting activities for upcoming Personal Development days.

We want to thank you for your hard work this term. We have been delighted with your engagement with our Instagram posts, clubs and displays over the last few weeks and we have had the honour of being able to display your work on our Instagram page. We have been able to showcase and share your creations with pupils, staff and parents/carer and are overjoyed with the outcomes. We have

enjoyed exploring the ways we have used Instagram to engage pupils with fun activities. We have shared live stories and QAs with you all.

All the groups did an incredible job and worked tirelessly to design new appliance that fits the changing world around us. During the first week back in Term 6, the teams set off for the national competition final and one team walked away with the win! Congratulations to all who won and attended. Each pupil from the winning




team received a brand-new top of the range appliance for their homes and the Academy also received a new appliance too.

Year 7 visited Magna Science Adventure Centre this term where they discovered the journey metal undertakes from extraction to manufacture. In particular they were treated to an amazing demonstration of how iron ore is combined with scrap metal in an ARC furnace to produce



steel. Pupils also discovered the history of UK steel manufacture and its significance in the industrialisation of modern Britain. This experience will prove invaluable in their studies around the origins and manufacture of metal in Term 3!





We had our very first Talk 4 Learning session across Art and Technology. Within this, pupils took on roles within groups to analyse and assess a piece of artwork. Pupils thrived within these roles and expanding their oracy skills whilst learning about how to improve their own artwork. We think these sessions were a massive success and have begun to include more sessions like this in our lessons within the curriculum.

We know that the world is more

phone focused and pupils spend more time on their phones then they did ten years ago. To adapt and find ways to keep you all engage we have introduced Tik Tok Tuesday. Once a week we share a tik tok that has some relation to one of our subjects and then we quiz you on what it showed. We

#### **Business and Computing Department**



#### **Computing Bebras Challenge 2022**

All KS3,4 and 5 Computing pupils took part in the Bebras Computing Challenge this term. The challenge introduces computational thinking to pupils. It is organised in over 50 countries and designed to get pupils all over the world excited about computing. Each participant answered questions that focus on computational and logical thinking.

We had some fantastic results, 32 pupils scored within the top 10% of the 50 countries who competed and received a gold certificate. They have been invited to join the next part of the challenge in Term3.





#### **Humanities Department - Geography**

This academic year the Geography department have been implementing their KS3. This year we have new topics, as well as developing our existing curriculum. Year 7 started the year learning 'what is geography' and developing their place and location knowledge on a variety of different scales. Most recently we have started to develop our geographical skills of reading maps and putting these skills to practise.

In Year 8, we started learning about Antarctica and what it is like to live in an extreme cold environment. Most recently, we have been studying population, how the global population has grown, exceeding 8 billion people only last month, as well as how and why populations have changed over time.

Year 9 started the year learning about our unequal world, how levels of development and quality of life vary around the world and how we can reduce the gap between the higher and lower income countries. We then progressed onto tectonic hazards, learning about the causes and impacts of different hazards around the world, including earthquakes, tsunamis, volcanic eruptions and super volcanoes.

Year 10 Geographers have just completed their first GCSE topic living with natural hazards, which explored tectonic and weather hazards along with climate change. We are now moving onto investigate the living world, or ecosystems, tropical rainforests and cold environments.

Year 11 started the year with a fieldtrip to the Holderness Coast, Hornsea, where they investigated coastal processes and management, this developed their skills and understanding ready for their geographical applications exam in the summer. It was a cold and windy day, but was great getting out of the classroom measuring the size of sediment, the size of the beach and the effectiveness of the sea defences.







We are just completing the urban issues and challenges topic and are just about to start the changing economic world unit of work. In the last week of term we are going on a human geography fieldtrip to Sheffield to investigate urban change and inequalities.







#### **Humanities Department - Geography**

Sixth form Geography pupils have made a great start to this year. They attended the annual sixth form geography conference at the University of Lincoln, followed by them visiting Lincoln city centre for some practical fieldwork experience looking into changing places and the contemporary urban environment.





We had a very cold and wet trip to the Holderness Coast, Flamborough Head, Hornsea and Mappleton, where we measured the size of the beaches, sediment, cliffs and the effectiveness of the coastal defences. This gave them valuable case study understanding and experience which prepares then to undertake their independent investigation later in the year which is a 4000 word report making up 20% of their A Level course. The bad weather was made more enjoyable by the fish and chips, hot chocolate and ice cream.

#### **Humanities Department - Debate Team**

The sixth form debating team took part in an inter schools' competition this term debating topics such as 'Should religion be taught in schools?', 'Should we pay a TV licence fee?' and 'should the World Cup be held In Qatar'. These debates encouraged pupils to develop their critical thinking and analytical skills be competing against Franklin College in Grimsby. Franklin posed difficult competition all the way through the debates on the day and it was a pleasure to host them at SRPA.

Five of our Year 12 pupils were able to take the trophy arguing that we should boycott the Qatar World Cup over human rights abuses relating to the treatment of migrant workers.

We look forward to the next round of competition on the 14<sup>th</sup> December, where we will go to Grimsby and compete against several schools in a larger competition. Wish us luck!





### **Attitude to Learning (A2L)**

At Sir Robert Pattinson Academy, we run a highly successful Attitudes to Learning Programme designed to support our pupils to achieve their very best. The programme has the following aims:

To drive engagement, aspiration, goals and resilience

To encourage pupils to be more engaged with their learning, have a thirst and curiosity to know more, do more and be more.

The A2L programme centres on developing and instilling 5 key attributes within our pupils. These are; willingness to learn, resilience, motivation/determination, teamwork and the ability to reflect. We believe these attributes are crucial in ensuring good behaviour and maximising progress for our pupils. Each term, subject teachers will complete an A2L Assessment. They will make a judgement based on pupil A2L and grade then as one of 4 types of learner - Expert, Highly Effective, Effective or Developing.

**Expert learners** are taking responsibility for their education and beyond. Becoming an expert learner is an outstanding achievement.

**Highly Effective learners** have a few target areas to work upon to become an expert learner but are showing many of the qualities needed to succeed.

**Effective learners** have a mixture of positive attitudes and a number to work upon.

**Developing learners** need to address a number of areas but have the potential to improve with all of the support available.

Following an A2L assessment, pupils will complete an A2L review as part of the R2L tutor programme. This can be seen in the pupil planner. Pupils will note their grades and set themselves targets to improve.

Pupils who have been graded overall as a Developing Learner or those that we feel are at risk of becoming a Developing Learner, will begin the *A2L Booster* intervention programme with the aim of improving their attitude towards learning. Pupils on this programme will receive a letter home informing parents and will begin a Booster report, which is led by the R2L tutor and monitored by the House team. Pupils with the greatest need will also receive mentoring from a member of staff who will work with them to improve their A2L. Pupils who are successful and improve their A2L grade will complete the programme. Those who are not will receive further intervention and support.

We are incredibly proud of our Expert Learners and see this as the benchmark that all pupils should aspire to reach. Expert Learners will be recognised and rewarded at different points throughout the year and those who show they are consistently an Expert Learner will receive an Expert Learner badge from the Head Teacher.

We are extremely proud of how well our pupils have engaged with the Academy's A2L programme so far this year. Parental support is a key factor in the success of the A2L programme and is always greatly appreciated. 


