English Department

It seems hardly any time has passed since the autumn term newsletter – probably because we have been so busy in the department that the time has flown by! In January, 125 Year 11 students visited the Theatre

Royal in Nottingham to see *An Inspector Calls* and, by all accounts, had a fantastic time. The staging of the production offered some nice surprises and gave students an invaluable opportunity to see one of their GCSE Literature texts brought to life on the stage. We were extremely proud of our students during the visit and it was to their credit that a member of the public took the time later to email Mr Hardy to praise their 'impeccable' manners and behaviour and to comment that our students had contributed to her having a 'thoroughly enjoyable afternoon'. Overall, this visit was a huge success and we look forward to more visits to see literature in performance as and when the opportunities arise.



By the time this newsletter is printed, 60 of our Year 9 students will have visited the National Justice Museum in Nottingham, linked to their current study of the play *Twelve Angry Men* which forms part of our US Literature unit. The museum houses a Victorian courtroom, Georgian gaol, and cells that date back hundreds of years, and offers students the chance to step back in time and hear real stories from the history of the gaol, as well as the opportunity to participate in a mock trial. Planning is also underway for a Year 8 trip to see Southwell Workhouse as part of their study of Victorian literature in the summer term. As a department, we are really enjoying the chance to show students how their study of English relates to the world around them and seeing how that translates into improved understanding of the texts we read in the





Our Subject Champions have been busy this term too. Before half term our KS3 Champions produced the promotional material for our short story competition and will be responsible for judging the entries when the competition closes at the end of term. Our KS5 Champions were on hand during Year 9 options evening to talk about GCSE Media Studies from a student perspective, giving invaluable advice to our younger students and ably assisting Mrs Murdoch with her subject presentations. As we finish the term, Mr Chetwynd has set our Year 9 and Year 10 Champions the task of choosing a new set text for Year 9, to fit into our Literature from Other Cultures unit which will be launched in 2023 - 2024.

Lastly, we can't end our contribution to the newsletter without mentioning our fantastic Year 11 and Year 13 students who continue to prepare for their examinations with determination and vigour. Attendance at our after school masterclasses for Year 11 has been steadily increasing over the course of the term and our Year 13 Language students have impressed us with their efforts in revising for the mock examinations. When the next newsletter is released, the examinations for both these year groups will be complete, so we take this opportunity to wish all of them well in A Level Language, GCSE English Language, GCSE English Literature and GCSE Media Studies.

World Book Day 2023

After the success of last year's World Book Day celebrations, Mrs Murdoch, our whole school reading lead, organised another fantastic day this year. Students in Years 7 to 11 were intro-

duced to five extracts from five novels over the course of five lessons and given the opportunity to review each one on a specially made review sheet which students carried with them for the whole day. Many of the review sheets handed in showed an exceptional level of engagement with reading from students across KS3 and KS4 and it was a pleasure to see students reading and responding to texts which they might never have thought to pick up just from the front cover alone. Winning review sheets were chosen from each year group and house and the students who completed them have won a copy of the book



which most intrigued them from the five they were introduced to on the day.



A World Book Day inspired book swap is also planned, giving students another opportunity to try something new that they perhaps wouldn't have read otherwise. Mrs Ransome, Librarian, gave out book tokens on the day too for students to redeem against any of this year's nominated books. The Library is always full, every break and lunchtime, but the atmosphere on World Book Day is always extra special and this year was no different. We hope that this year's celebrations have inspired even more of our students to say: 'I am a reader'.

students wanting to write creatively and a real source of pride to have so many published authors in our school!








The Art, Photography and Technology department has had a great start to 2023, awe have had the wonderful opportunity to display all the different talents we have here within the Academy. We have challenged our students with PD Day activities, multi-media experimentation, Options evening, subject champion meetings and KS4 curriculum catch-up sessions.

Curriculum Delivery

Year 7 Artists have been looking at line art and have been recreating their own masterpieces in a triptych style. They have put together all their knowledge of line and tone to refine the thicknesses of line to create outcomes inspired by Carl Krull. For homework, our artists have been using photography to explore line and have made some exciting outcomes.

Year 8 Artists have been working on developing their knowledge of tone and design by creating their own gargoyle drawings inspired by the Lincoln Imp. They have been exploring the history of the gargoyle and how it has changed in modern day to become more of an ornament. In the next term, students will create their own 3D gargoyles out of wire and clay.





Year 9 have been exploring their understanding of clay by creating their own 3D outcomes of different food items. They have then began to explore photography by using cameras in a studio setting to experiment with lighting. The students have then moved onto composition to help develop their understanding of layout in preparation for GCSE Art or Photography.

GCSE Art and Photography students have begun their coursework this term. They have been given the topic titles of; facades, man vs nature, food and drink, groups and childhood. They have had to choose one of these topics and begin to develop a portfolio based around that topic. Artists have begun their initial observations in drawing form and photographers in a digital photography form.

Our Year 7 Technologists have been focusing on exploring their understanding of health and safety within the workshop. They have then taken this knowledge and applied it whilst exploring wood types, cutting and adhesion processes to create their own pen pots. Within Food and Nutrition Year 7's are developing their knife skills, learning how to use a peeler and how to correctly dice an onion making crudites for their first practical, spicy tomato soup and apple crumble. This will also start their journey in learning how to use a hob and oven safely. Alongside this they have been learning about the Eatwell Guide and the different nutrients our body needs. As an important factor of the course students have been

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asked to evaluate each practical for their homework to reflect on their skills and where they can improve.



Year 8's have focused on exploring arts and crafts design movement and how they can come up with won coaster inspired by the movement. Learning the intricacies of CNC (Computer numeric control) they have worked on casting in the workshop, creating their own unique creative designs that are both high quality and eye-catching.



Year 9 have had the homework tasks to create chairs. Some made miniature versions, and some went above and beyond the scale expectations! Lyla D created a chair using steel


rebar, pallet wood and other supplies and produced a chair fit for a king. Students have also been working on developing their understanding of isometric drawings by sketching pencil sharpeners and then moving up to bottles.

During their lessons, the Year 10 students are expanding their knowledge of metals by exploring the


same practical sessions as KS3 but with more of a

focus on the theory behind the material and practical skills. All the creators within Design and Technology have worked hard exploring the various tools, machines and processes involved in the practical

based lessons.



Our Year 11's have been working hard preparing for their upcoming exams. In tech, they have been revising by doing exam style questions and continuing their



practical coursework by making their final products. In Art and Photography, students have been working on their exam unit by creating a portfolio of evidence refining experiments to come up with a final piece idea for the exam in April.



Business and Computing Department - Be Inspired Day



Hosted by the School of Computer Science at Lincoln University - 9 March 2023

Year 12 A-Level Computer Science students attended a day of inspiring sessions put on by the School of Computer Science at Lincoln University to advertise their courses for their next steps in education. The day included discussing the future of technology in education, a robotics building task using

some toothbrush heads, a session on video game development lead by a former video game developer and a session on computer science where they used Google APIs and a mobile phone to take photos of each other and put through the API to detect firstly emotions that were present on their faces and then object detection exploring how machine learning works on a world wide scale.

The students had a fun and engagement (though sometimes challenging) day but rose to the challenge and completed all activities fully.

Students discussed the following points,

Our young people demonstrated an incredible level of professionalism and talent and we can't wait to see what they do next!





























Performing Arts Department - Splendid Workshop




at a Russell Group university. I am excited to be part of SSLT at RP6th and to make a difference within the Academy.



Bormio Ski Trip 2023



During February half term, 72 students and 9 staff embarked on the adventure of a lifetime. We departed SRPA at 4:30pm on the Thursday and started the epic journey to Bormio in Italy. It was a long journey, made enjoyable by the on-coach entertainment, a range of DVD's and singing on the party bus (not forgetting the chips and milkshakes in the service station in Switzerland). We finally arrived at our hotel Villa Rina in Bormio at 8:30pm on the Friday. We took out bags into the hotel and went straight out to dinner, where we enjoyed our first experience of authentic Italian pasta. What we didn't know was that it was the first of many to come. We then settled into our rooms and went straight to sleep.





The next day was Saturday. We were awoken particularly early by the brilliant wake up call, followed by breakfast. Then it was a nice walk to the ski hire shop, then up the gondola to the 2,000m station. We met our instructors, and the lessons began. The intermediate group were quick to disappear up the ski lifts and they spent the day skiing down a wide range of slopes. In the afternoon, they skied down to the town and down part of the 'World Cup' run and a section called the 'Wall'. This lived up to its name and was a sheer vertical section of the slope. This was challenging to negotiate, far easier for the elite racers who literally flew over this section! The beginners had a brilliant day learning the basics on the nursery slopes around the 2,000m level, getting to grips with the fundamentals of ski control.

It was quite warm and despite being surrounded by snow, the Alps did not have as much snow as previous years. It was noticeably melting by the end of the week, with high temperatures and no snowfall during the week.

Despite this we had a brilliant week of learning to ski and snowboard. Everyone got to go up to the top of the mountain at 3,000m above sea level. As the week progressed, so did our students, improving their ski and snowboarding techniques and progressing from the nursery slopes. All students had a brilliant week and improved throughout the trip. At times, the sking was physically demanding and hard, but it was a great opportunity for the students to show how resilient they were, and the discomfort was worth it for the thrill of flying down the mountain enjoying the spectacular scenery.

The evenings were a chance to unwind after a day of full on skiing and boarding, but at the same time, were packed full of activities. One night, we had a really enjoyable and competitive quiz, hosted by Mr Whitley and Miss Evans, with a not to be forgotten music round, sung (in the loosest sense of the word) by Mr Whitley. We went to a local venue to have a disco and Karaoke night, the karaoke was so popular we didn't get much disco dancing done. It was brilliant to see the students from Years 8 to 13 getting involved, and supported by the teachers. It was a very enjoyable night. We spent an evening visiting the shops and ice cream shops of Bormio. We went ice skating for an evening and the fun evening was concluded with a recreation of Torvill and Dean's Winning 1984 Olympic Bolero. The last night, we enjoyed a presentation of certificates by the ski school, a video of our weeks skiing highlights and pizza. The pizza kept coming and it was a brilliant end to the week, before we embarked on the mammoth journey back to Lincoln (which strangely seemed shorter on the way home).

The trip was brilliant and made even more enjoyable by the students on it who were a credit to themselves and the Academy.

Thank you to all the staff who gave up their half term to take the students to Italy. We are looking forward to the 2024 ski trip which Mr White is organising.





Attitude to Learning (A2L)

At Sir Robert Pattinson Academy, we run a highly successful Attitudes to Learning Programme designed to support our pupils to achieve their very best. The programme has the following aims:

- To drive engagement, aspiration, goals and resilience
- To encourage pupils to be more engaged with their learning, have a thirst and curiosity to know more, do more and be more.



The A2L programme centres on developing and instilling 5 key attributes within our pupils. These are; willingness to learn, resilience, motivation/determination, teamwork and the ability to reflect. We believe these attributes are crucial in ensuring good behaviour and maximising progress for our pupils. Each term, subject teachers will complete an A2L Assessment. They will make a judgement based on pupil A2L and grade then as one of 4 types of learner - Expert, Highly Effective, Effective or Developing.

Expert learners are taking responsibility for their education and beyond. Becoming an expert learner is an outstanding achievement.

Highly Effective learners have a few target areas to work upon to become an expert learner but are showing many of the qualities needed to succeed.

Effective learners have a mixture of positive attitudes and a number to work upon.

Developing learners need to address a number of areas but have the potential to improve with all of the support available.

Expert learner	800 house points
Highly Effective learner	600 house points
Effective learner	400 house points
Developing learner	200 house points

From all the grades that a pupil receives, an overall A2L grade is calculated. This overall grade will earn pupils the following house points:

Following an A2L assessment, pupils will complete an A2L review as part of the R2L tutor programme. This can be seen in the pupil planner. Pupils will note their grades and set themselves targets to improve.

Pupils who have been graded overall as a Developing Learner or those that we feel are at risk of becoming a Developing Learner, will begin the *A2L Booster* intervention programme with the aim of improving their attitude towards learning. Pupils on this programme will receive a letter home informing parents and will begin a Booster report, which is led by the R2L tutor and monitored by the House team. Pupils with the greatest need will also receive mentoring from a member of staff who will work with them to improve their A2L. Pupils who are successful and improve their A2L grade will complete the programme. Those who are not will receive further intervention and support.

We are incredibly proud of our Expert Learners and see this as the benchmark that all pupils should aspire to reach. Expert Learners will be recognised and rewarded at different points throughout the year and those who show they are consistently an Expert Learner will receive an Expert Learner badge from the Head Teacher.

We are extremely proud of how well our pupils have engaged with the Academy's A2L programme so far this year. Parental support is a key factor in the success of the A2L programme and is always greatly appreciated. 
