As we pass the midpoint of the academic year, the Art, Photography and Technology department has seen some truly exceptional student work. The Spring term has brought looming coursework deadlines for all our Year 11 students, but their performance across Art, Design Technology, Engineering and Hospitality & Catering has been commendable. Since the Winter break, we have seen the school production of Romeo and Juliet, had Year 11 Technology practical drop-down days and seen great success by the Hospitality students in their mock NEAs. All of this, and so much more, is on top of wonderful lesson work, in which students have explored their understanding through an enormous breadth of lesson tasks, from culinary knife cuts, to gouache painting and 3D CAD modelling.

#### **Curriculum Delivery**

Year 7 Artists have been exploring the formal elements of line and shape, through the study of the work of Vincent van Gogh and Wassily Kandinsky. To discover shape, students have been using watercolours to paint geometric shapes, before cutting them out and collaging them, just as Kandinsky would have done. Kandinsky is known as the 'pioneer of abstract painting', and the analysis of his work has allowed our learners to value the journey of producing the work as much as the aesthetics of the final piece. Some students have since used their growing confidence in the subject to work back into their paintings, adding greater detail and depth to their lesson work. This has continued into their study of line, and van Gogh, who uses a variety of broken, curved and expressive lines to build his 'Starry Night' painting, that students noted avalved a monde.



build his 'Starry Night' painting, that students noted evoked a mood of both chaos and loneliness.


Students should also be enormously proud of their sketchbook presentation, and the pride they are taking in their work, as we deliver our new Key Stage Three curriculum for the first time.

Year 8 Artists started the term building on their knowledge of tone by applying different types of charcoal, to revisit their formal elements learning from Year 7. We observed students using a range of strategies, such as pressure and blending with tools, to create tonal ladders, before progressing to more complex tasks like three-dimensional form sketching. The students have analysed the natural study work of Georgia O'Keeffe, by considering the areas of deeper or lighter tones in her depictions and creating their own responses to them. They have since been developing their knowledge of tone through studying the work of lan Scott Massie and creating responses to his landscape compositions. Students have used a range of tone, this time through gouache tints and shades, applying brushstrokes to create the illusion of depth in their compositions. The project concluded with the practical assessment, in which students had an hour to create an



A3 tonal landscape painted in gouache, as Massie would have done. They should be so proud of what they achieved in the time!








Year 9 Artists have been exploring their understanding of the formal elements of and texture progressing from small studies repeated pattens, to larger printed compositions. Every Year 9 student has now chosen their GCSE options for September: the students have been preparing for GCSE Art and Design by considering Assessment Objective 1: demonstrating critical understanding of an artist's work. Our artists have used clear success criteria to produce detailed written responses to work, depicting why they have, or have not,

been successful. After the February half term, students covered the work of Molly Lemon, who explored organic shape and form through her lino prints. We carved our own line responses, before inking and printing onto paper. Students have been finishing these off with great care, selecting a monochrome palette to showcase the detail in their artwork. We look forward to making a start with our Year 9 cohort selecting Art and Design when the new term begins in September.

GCSE Art and Photography Year 11 students have completed with their first coursework submission this term, which culminated in a tenhour examination: students created summative responses to their studies, with some working on larger scales, or with new materials. It was fantastic to see each student pursuing their personal areas of interest as they built their portfolios, and showing off their artistic prowess in more complicated final pieces. Examination work is now well underway, as all students create new sketchbooks under new themes; just as one year group completes, another starts! Our Year 10 students have been creating their first initial observations under their topic of 'Nature vs Manmade', recording from live studies in the classroom. A range of mark-making strategies have been implemented by the Artists, as they aim to capture what they can see before them. This work was presented effectively in books, as our Year 10s consider the impact of sketchbook presentation for the very first time.





Over in Design and Technology, our Year 7 Technologists have been building their workshop confidence in their production of two metal coat hooks. They have learnt about where metals come from, how they are made and how they can be formed into products for use in industry worldwide. We have discussed how ferrous metals corrode and oxidise, and so have used the thermoforming centres in the workshops to dip coat our steel coat hooks. Students have explored finishing processes even further by polishing their brass coat hooks with wet and dry paper. Within Food and Nutrition Year 7 are developing their ability to work independently and manage their own time, as they complete more complex recipes each week.



This term has seen our chefs producing pizza toast and apple crumble. Each week students are using their ovens, hobs and knives with greater ability, perhaps because of their effective reflection tasks at the end of practical lessons.






Year 8 Technologists have focused on exploring the Art Deco movement, along with how they can include famous attributes of the period in design work under the topic of 'designs for a celebration'. Students have evidenced metallic colour, graphic geometric shapes and in their pencil sketches. contrast Knowledge of CAD and CAM from last term has been built on with a second laser cut outcome that students have

been casting in the workshop in practical lessons. Our Year 8s donned goggles and heatproof gloves to use butane torches to melt their pewter in a ladle, before pouring into moulds. Some have also been recapping their rendering skills, in preparation for the summer assessments. Within Food and Nutrition, the students have been learning about different mixing methods, and following recipes to produce dishes that evidence their new learning. This has included beating egg whites to make mayonnaise, binging mince with egg to make burgers, and rolling sponge to make Swiss rolls. We are sure you will agree they look delicious!

Year 9 Technology classes have had the task of prototyping a series of products this year, in preparation for the Non Examined Assessment they will complete if they chose Design and Technology GCSE. Our Technologists started the year considering motion in the manufacture of a pick-up stick, and have since focussed on applying their electronics knowledge to a model torch. In the last few weeks, this has been evidenced in End of Unit Assessments, in which students received areas of focus to improve





their scores next time. In the upcoming term, forces and stresses will be revisited, as students complete a series of mini projects, including a prototype bridge. At each stage, students are learning the value of reflection, and the vast potential of employing this reflection to improve design ideas at a later date. We hope that this will best prepare those students joining us in September on the GCSE for the coursework element of their studies. Within Food and Nutrition, students have finessed their scientific knowledge of the subject – producing bread rolls when learning about yeast and the role of raising agents – with some impressive results!





During their lessons, the Year 10 Design and Technology GCSE students have made an exciting start to their practice NEA coursework: choosing a context and a client and producing their first sketched responses to their own handwritten brief. This is an exciting opportunity for all students, particularly those considering a career in design, as it replicates the industry approach to the iterative design cycle. All the creators within Design and Technology have made a great start, following personal interests of products, materials and workshop processes while completing the Timbers mini-projects. Our Technologists used four different timber joints to hold a laser cut frame as a prototype for a picture frame, before evaluating the success of each joining method. In Food and Nutrition, our students have been revisiting their knowledge of pastry, honing their culinary skills of presentation too, as they set about producing a different recipe each week: we have seen sausage rolls, Danish pastries,

croissants and, in recent weeks, students demonstrating exceptional attitude to learning as they cook. They have also been developing their skills in producing time plans, as they look ahead to future examinations, in which several dishes must be produced in a single time frame.

It is a shame Year 11 coursework is kept top secret at this time of year, or we are sure we could write a newsletter on their successes alone. Our Year 11s in all of our subjects should be commended for their focus during the mock examination period, and their continued effort in their coursework lessons afterwards. We have all seen great attendance to intervention and revision sessions, and students meeting coursework deadlines. As a department, we wish all of our students the very best of luck for the Summer examinations, results day and their next steps in September and beyond.

#### **Student Experience**

The Art, Photography and Technology Department have been blown away by the additional work completed by our young people this term. We have been able to share fantastic work both on the SRPA Instagram, and even in features in Mr Hardy's weekly letters to parents. It is wonderful to have work made to such a high standard that we get the opportunity to share it with students, parents and colleagues – to those involved, we are so proud of your exceptional hard work.

Our wonderful Subject Champions have been busy this term, running and entering competitions in school. Last term, the group ran a whole-school competition designing gingerbread men, before delicately laminating, hole punching and tying to ribbons to decorate the foyer of the St Barnabas Hospice in Lincoln. This term we have assisted with the Bake Sale, designed book review templates for the library, and won school competitions in designing cupcakes inspired by our favourite books, all to support World Book Day.

In recent weeks, Year 7 students have been enjoying an afternoon off timetable on Personal Development Day to develop their STEM skills: learning about advertising and marketing products before joining us in the department to create their visual responses. Students worked so well when considering what effective design looks like and engaging with others in a team. The entries to the Warburton's design challenges will be sent back to the PD team for judging – fingers crossed if you entered!




Our Year 12 Product Design students visited Siemens, Lincoln to explore how gas turbines are made and used. They gained industry experience through their observations of the machinery and valuable knowledge from the discussions held by the staff at the site.

Miss Kelter has completed community outreach visiting The Meadows Primary School to support with Art and Design curriculum development, through development of staff skills and confidence. Her print workshop saw the staff drawing monoprint templates and printing onto paper, ready to implement their new knowledge with the children in the Summer term.



In the new year, all Year 9 students received a postcard from their Design and Technology teachers recommending their next steps as they progress into Year 10. Students faced the difficult decision between GCSE Design and Technology, Photography and Art and Design, as well as BTEC Hospitality Catering and CNAT Engineering Design. We have seen record numbers of students applying for our courses and feel so proud of their determination to pursue their next steps in our department. If you are considering a career in any of your school subjects, please do speak to



your teachers or any of us in the department – we will happily support you in your progress.

Perhaps the highlight of the term has been the teamwork we have seen from the students, teachers and support staff in our department in preparation for the school play 'Romeo and Juliet'. Hospitality and Catering students helped cook a plethora of dishes for opening night, with some fantastic Year 10s offering service of food and drink on the night. Year 12 Design and Technology students followed the iterative design process required in their coursework to research, sketch and model their ideas for the set design, before turning to 3D CAD and rapid prototyping to quickly realise their ideas, evaluate and remake, solving any issues detected in their work so far. We painted and made the set, designed and made the programme, hand cut and assembled the tissue paper flowers, drove to IKEA to source fake plants for the stage, built the platforms – the list goes


on! Opening night was an enormous success, and we would love to congratulate all the students involved, whether that was on or off the stage.

#### **English Department**

It seems hardly any time has passed since the autumn term newsletter – probably because we have been so busy in the department that the time has flown by! The department is currently busy planning a trip for Year 9 and Year 10 students to see a performance of R.L. Stevenson's gothic masterpiece *The Strange Tale of Doctor Jekyll and Mr Hyde* at the Guildhall Arts Centre in Grantham. We can't wait to see what spooky surprises the production has in store.



After the success of last year's World Book Day celebrations, Mrs Murdoch organised another fantastic day this year. Students in Years 7 to 11 were introduced to five extracts from five novels over the course of five lessons and given the opportunity to review each one on a specially made review sheet which students carried with them for the whole day. Many of the review sheets handed in showed an exceptional level of engagement with reading from students across Key Stage 3 and 4 and it was a pleasure to see students reading and

responding to texts which they might never have thought to pick up just from the front cover alone. Winning review sheets were chosen from each year group and house and the

students who completed them have won a copy of the book which most intrigued them from the five they were introduced to on the day.





In Year 7, students have had a fantastic time with their unit on the spy genre: teachers have thoroughly enjoyed watching students present their ideas for a new spy gadget with some groups performing very persuasive adverts, complete with demonstrations and spy villains. Year 8 students have impressed us with their maturity as we have been reading the

Shakespeare play "A Midsummer Night's Dream" alongside watching a version of

the play from the Royal Shakespeare Company. The plot is complicated, with many twists and turns, and students have shown incredible resilience in navigating their way through the story and keeping up with all the characters and their constantly changing allegiances.







## **English Department**

Also showing great maturity, Year 9 students have begun preparing for their GCSE English Language spoken language presentations and by the time this newsletter is printed, they will have completed these. Whilst there is always an opportunity for students to re-sit this part of the

qualification in Year 10 or 11, we find this rarely happens because Year 9 students always make the very most of the opportunity to tell



their peers all about a subject which interests them! Past topics have included fishing, managing diabetes, Doctor Who, mistakes made by government during



Covid, and the subject of footballers' pay (to name only a very few!) so we can't wait to see what our students come up with this year.

Year 10 students have continued to work hard over terms 3 and 4 and, by Easter, will have completed all of the preliminary learning for GCSE English Language and all of the content for English Literature paper 1, just in time for



the Year 10 examinations in term 5. In addition to homework, students are reminded that it's never too



early to start revising and there are plenty of materials available for students to access free of charge on Seneca, Massolit, BBC Bitesize and the English department subject page on SRPA's Frog site.

Lastly, we can't end our contribution to the newsletter without mentioning our fantastic Year 11 and Year 13 students who continue to prepare for their examinations with determination and vigour. Attendance at our after-school masterclasses for Year 11 has been steadily increasing

over the course of the term and our Year 13 Language and Literature students have impressed us with their efforts in revising for the mock examinations and their commitment to making the improvements suggested as a result of these. When the next newsletter is released, the examinations for both these year groups will be complete, so we take this opportunity to wish all of them well in A Level Language, A Level Literature, GCSE English Language, GCSE English Literature and GCSE Media Studies.





# **English Department - Library News**

Here at Sir Robert Pattinson Academy, we encourage reading in our Library from 8am in the morning to 4pm, social times and curriculum times. We run Rise and Read from 8am, which sees the Library open for students to read in a quiet environment before the start of their day.

Students in Key Stage 3 have a library lesson once a fortnight as part of their English curriculum time so there are plenty of opportunities to borrow books and read. X band students work on Literary Snapshot booklets designed by Mrs Murdoch, our teacher with responsibility for reading, answering questions on extracts from popular books like 'Enola Holmes, Wonder, The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time' and many more. Y band students follow the Accelerated Reader programme, reading from our wide range of texts and completing quizzes to check for understanding.

Our Library provision, both in and out of lesson times, supports every student to be able to say '*I* am a reader'.

#### **Young Writers news**

Congratulations to Connor R, Isabelle J, Kimberley M, Archie A and Phoebe H who have had their poems published. Another eighteen students await their 100 word stories being judged. Details of the latest Young Writers competitions are always on display in the Library if you would like to get involved!



#### **Bedrock**

Bedrock is used for English homework for all students in Key Stage 3 and is proven to have a positive impact on students' vocabulary and grammar, which, in turn, impacts student progress across the curriculum. In March 2024, 7Y/En1 were our top performing class and scored 1941 points. The average points per student in this class was 63. Kai B scored 645 points - the most in the school!




#### **Mathematics Department**

#### **Intermediate Mathematical Challenge, Wednesday 31 January:**

Our 9X/Ma1, 10X/Ma1 and 11X/Ma1 students took part in the Intermediate Mathematical Challenge in January. This is a 25 question multiple choice paper full of interesting problems that extend our pupils' understanding of mathematics. The students sat the challenge in the Sports Hall under formal examination conditions and followed expectations for behaviour and preparedness admirably.

When the results came in, the Mathematics Department were impressed with our highest number of Silver and Bronze awards to date! Two students managed to achieve a Gold, scoring 77 or above; 13 students received a Silver, scoring 61 or above; and 25 students achieved a Bronze award, scoring 47 or above! Erin C scored the highest in Year 9, Tabitha D was Best in Year 10 and Jack T scored an incredible 99 marks to achieve Best in School, and Year 11. Jack was also invited to a follow-on round of the competition, the Pink Kangaroo, which was held on Thursday 21<sup>st</sup> March. We look forward to hearing how he does over the Easter break.



#### **Maths Feast, Wednesday 6 March:**

Eight Year 10 Mathematicians visited William Farr School with Miss Smith and Mr Spence to take part in the inter-school "*Maths Feast*" competition. Several other Lincolnshire schools were in attendance, many of which were grammar schools or privately funded schools. The organisers of the event, AMSP (Advanced Mathematics Support Programme) were impressed by our two highly capable teams, as many other institutions only took one team to the event.

The students opted to separated into a Boys' team of four pupils, and a girls' team of four. Miss



Smith chaired the girls' team and Mr Spence was with the boys. Our brains were all fuelled by refreshments kindly provided by William Farr School. Our students were very pleased with the lovely cakes and Mr Spence kept his team's spirits high by bringing their refreshments to them!

As we sat down, there was an introductory problem in the form of a number search (a Mathematical wordsearch) to warm up our students' problem-solving skills. Then, we started the four competitive rounds, each of which took 20-30 minutes and were worth 25 points:



#### **Mathematics Department**

- Round 1 was based on television quiz shows such as the 1% club, Richard Osman's
  House of Games, and Only Connect. There were sequences to complete, instructions
  given with just consonants and missing vowels, and a large problem about estimating
  averages using populations.
- 2. Next, round 2 was a Cross Number which required the use of a calculator to answer complex calculations. The girls' team enjoyed this round the most. Just before the claxon, one of our pupils said, "just put any number in that final box!" and the girls' team scored 4 extra points for filling out the entire grid.
- 3. A series of logic puzzles followed for round 3, providing rules for '*Hat Wearing*'. Our boys' team scored very well in this round, and enjoyed working collaboratively to rule out any options that did not follow the instructions outlined at the start of the problem.
- 4. Finally, in round 4, students had to construct cubes and rhombic dodecahedra using rectangular card and sticky tape. Both teams quickly made production lines, and displayed fantastic time management as they chose to place each person in charge of their area of strength. Agnes, Alex and Aidan were all origami superstars!

At the end of the competition, although neither of our teams won overall, the boys were awarded the Teamwork Certificate for their enthusiastic, consistent and inclusive participation in all activities. Students gave positive feedback to the organisers via a QR code survey and would recommend that we use some of the puzzles and materials for Year 10 students in future.





We drove back to the Academy, making good time to arrive back for 14:00. As we discussed the day, students were pleased that the questions were "outside of the curriculum" and that the problems "got you thinking". They felt like "academics" and understood further "how Maths can help us in later life".



Our pupils were a credit to and the Academy hopefully, have been inspired to pursue Mathematics beyond their A Level studies. AMSP presented various other options for extra/supercurricular events resources that Miss Smith plans to use with multiple year groups over the remainder of the academic year, and in all academic years to come.



#### **Performing Arts Department**



Last term, the Academy presented Romeo & Juliet the Musical. The performance saw the classic tale of star-crossed lovers woven with chart hits to create our own, original musical. The run saw sell out shows and rave reviews of the production, with over 80 students making up the amazing cast and crew. Taking on Shakespeare is not easy, and we are so privileged to work with so many talented young people that almost all lead roles were shared by two performers!



We are still amazed by all the positive feedback we received and cannot wait to get started on our next project. I wonder what we will do next year?





#### **RP6th** - Lincolnshire Schools Oxbridge Conference

On 15 March 2024, a group of Year 12 students enjoyed an informative day at the Lincolnshire Schools Oxbridge Conference, hosted by The Priory Academy, LSST.

Students selected which sessions they wished to attend from a Programme menu, to personalise their own areas of interest.

Admissions Officers from both Oxford and Cambridge, tutors, and past and present Oxbridge students conveyed their

knowledge and experiences, in sessions such as Studying

Languages at Oxbridge, Preparing for UCAT, Life at Oxbridge and the Personal Statement.


Year 13 students who have successfully gained conditional offers this year, gave insightful advice in respect of their application, assessment, and interview experiences.

Amelia found the conference interesting, particularly hearing


about the experiences of students who have been or will go to Oxbridge, 'telling us how the interviews and personal statements work and what they did to receive offers'.

We would like to thank our alumni and their employers for giving up their time.














#### **House News - Academy Values**



to encourage as many people as possible to participate. The students have done an excellent job with planning the project thus far. Some of the Key Stage 4 House Captains will be joining Mrs Hought and Mrs Hodson to deliver the eggs to the ward. You may remember that we previously donated 100 Easter eggs to The Rainforest Ward in 2022; we would love for this year to be as successful.

Peer mentoring continues to grow from strength to strength as the year has gone on. We now have more than 20 pairings meeting every week, with new mentors volunteering regularly. We have a wide range of students from all year groups meeting every week to talk over their issues and concerns. It has been a pleasure to see all involved forging new friendships and finding the support useful. We are on the lookout for new mentors as our older students are focussing more on their studies. All are welcome!

We have also held assemblies focussing on International Women's Day; sharing information about various women and their achievements. Sharing this is so important in highlighting how far we have come as well as where we go next. Students were engaged and interested in

what was shared; it was fantastic to see their reactions and listen to their thoughts at the end.

We are excited to launch the SRPA spring clean and respect for your school environment initiative in term 5 which will give all of our students the opportunity to play their part in improving our surroundings.



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#### **House News - Academy Values**



The Academy continues to encourage its students to reflect on their performance and strive to make improvements. Each term, following Attitude to Learning (A2L) assessments, students are able to view their assessments, highlight weaknesses and set themselves targets for improvement as part of the Personal Development programme. It is encouraging, as always, to see the majority of our students falling within Highly Effective and the number of Expert Learners ever-increasing. Being an Expert Learner is a fantastic achievement and is recognition of hard work, excellent engagement, resilience and a desire to improve.

Well done to all of those students who have worked hard to increase their A2L this term and to all of our Expert Learners; we are incredibly proud of you!

Term 3 saw the launch of the Reflection World Cup! This is a whole Academy knock-out competition where students perform reflection tasks to win prizes. Round one asked students to set themselves meaningful New Year resolutions. There were some amazing entries where students have deeply considered the impact their actions can have on those around them. Some wonderful examples are below:

Isabelle (Year 8) – "I would like to crochet hats and stuffed animals for babies in need and donate to charities. I will also help my grandmother in making hats for premature babies".

Isabelle (Year 8) – "To become a peer mentor and help younger students with their problems and help them become more confident".

Harriet (Year 8) - "To be able to make a meal using all home-grown fruit and vegetables".

Molly (Year 10) - "To make people laugh around me because laughter solves everything and makes the world go round!"

The competition will progress after Easter with those who qualified from round one representing their form groups and house into the final stages.

The Green Team have been busy preparing gardens ready for the summer. We now have an indoor greenhouse, which we have been using to propagate seedlings and bulbs. Some early bulbs have already been planted in the 6<sup>th</sup> form garden and we look forward to seeing them flourish as the weather improves.



We have also received a large donation of trees and hedges from the Wildlife Trust. These saplings are going to be planted around the

Academy site as well as adding to the 6<sup>th</sup> form and RCC gardens. The trees and hedges have been specially selected to attract wildlife and for their beautiful summer fauna. Currently, the 6<sup>th</sup> form garden is nursing the trees in readiness for planting out.

Plans to improve the RCC garden are well underway. The Key Stage 3 House Captains have been designing segments of the garden. When the weather is more favourable, we will begin planting with the aim of making a garden that promotes positive mental health and a place for wildlife to thrive.

We have managed to recycle 25kgs of batteries that we have collected over the year. These batteries will be stripped down and the metals recycled, rather than them just going to landfill. We collected so many, they couldn't take them all!

All of our current projects are aimed at retaining our Eco-Schools accreditation. The Green team have big plans for next term in areas concerning recycling, energy conservation, littering and our entry into the Lincolnshire Agricultural Show, where we will be planning, designing and building a miniature showground with bees and wildlife in mind.



#### **House - Anti-bullying**

The Anti-bullying Ambassadors have had a brilliant term. They have been busy coming up with ways in which to include the wider Academy in their vision. This has led to the creation of Anti-Bullying Representatives. Two students from each form will be voted in and will represent their form's views at the Anti-Bullying Forum, which will take place every term. This will be a place for open conversation about bullying. The Anti-bullying Ambassadors are passionate about seeing

our Academy stamp out bullying behaviour, and this will

be another step towards this goal.

They have also been collaborating with the House Captains, seeing Welcome Wednesdays flourish, as many students come to gather on a Wednesday to play cards, do some colouring, or just have a chat with one another. We have seen an influx of different year groups creating

a supportive community on a Wednesday. Student Mentors and mentees have also used this as a place where they can

have that extra chat where needed.

Overall, we raised £69.30 towards St Barnabas. We are looking forward to seeing what you create in our next event! This adds to the £5211 already raised.















## **Attitude to Learning (A2L)**

At Sir Robert Pattinson Academy, we run a highly successful Attitudes to Learning Programme designed to support our pupils to achieve their very best. The programme has the following aims:

- To drive engagement, aspiration, goals and resilience
- To encourage pupils to be more engaged with their learning, have a thirst and curiosity to know more, do more and be more.



The A2L programme centres on developing and instilling 5 key attributes within our pupils. These are; willingness to learn, resilience, motivation/determination, teamwork and the ability to reflect. We believe these attributes are crucial in ensuring good behaviour and maximising progress for our pupils. Each term, subject teachers will complete an A2L Assessment. They will make a judgement based on pupil A2L and grade them as one of 4 types of learner - Expert, Highly Effective, Effective or Developing.

**Expert Learners** are taking responsibility for their education and beyond. Becoming an expert learner is an outstanding achievement.

**Highly Effective Learners** have a few target areas to work upon to become an expert learner but are showing many of the qualities needed to succeed.

Effective Learners have a mixture of positive attitudes and a number to work upon.

**Developing Learners** need to address a number of areas but have the potential to improve with all of the support available.

From all the grades that a pupil receives, an overall A2L grade is calculated. This overall grade will earn pupils the following house points:

Expert Learner	800 house points				
Highly Effective Learner	600 house points				
Effective Learner	400 house points				
Developing Learner	200 house points				

Following an A2L assessment, pupils will complete an A2L review as part of the R2L tutor programme. This can be seen in the pupil planner. Pupils will note their grades and set themselves targets to improve.

Pupils who have been graded overall as a Developing Learner or those that we feel are at risk of becoming a Developing Learner, will begin the *A2L Booster* intervention programme with the aim of improving their attitude towards learning. Pupils on this programme will receive a letter home informing parents and will begin a Booster report, which is led by the R2L tutor and monitored by the House team. Pupils with the greatest need will also receive mentoring from a member of staff who will work with them to improve their A2L. Pupils who are successful and improve their A2L grade will complete the programme. Those who are not will receive further intervention and support.

We are incredibly proud of our Expert Learners and see this as the benchmark that all pupils should aspire to reach. Expert Learners will be recognised and rewarded at different points throughout the year and those who show they are consistently an Expert Learner will receive an Expert Learner badge from the Headmaster.

We are extremely proud of how well our pupils have engaged with the Academy's A2L programme so far this year. Parental support is a key factor in the success of the A2L programme and is always greatly appreciated. 
