UEFA Women's European Championship 2025

This summer, the Women's Euros are back, being hosted in the picturesque country of Switzerland for the first time. Going into the tournament, some countries are undoubtedly favourites, these include England, Spain, France and Germany. England are, of course, going to be one of the ones to watch, especially since they are defending their European title, that they deservedly earned back in the 2022 European championships, having broken the curse and finally bringing football home in the home of English football, Wembley Stadium. So, the

Lionesses now have the chance to defend their title in a different country, hopefully to show off their incredible standard of football to spectators elsewhere.

In 2022, the Lionesses went through the entire tournament undefeated (1-0 against Austria; 8-0 against Norway; 5-0 against Northern Ireland; 2-1 against Spain; 4-0 against Sweden and 2-1 against Germany) and won it on home soil. The 2022 European Championships was the first major tournament the England women's team had won and England, as a footballing nation, had finally won a major trophy since 1966 – 56 years later! The 2022 final took place on the 31st July against Germany – of course, it just had to be. In the 62nd minute, Ella Toone chipped the goalkeeper after an impressive pass from Keira Walsh, making it 1-0 but, unfortunately, in the 79th minute Lina Magull equalised, drawing the score level. After the full 90 minutes, the score was still level, leading to an extra 30 minutes to be played. Luckily, in the 110th minute a corner was taken by Lauren Hemp and Chloe Kelly managed to poke the ball into the back of net, letting England take back the lead. After 10 minutes of nervy, traditional, English style of play, the final whistle was blown, crowning England the European Champions.

The success of the women's team caused a surge in popularity in women's football in England, whether it be attendances or those getting involved. In the words of Leah Williamson: "The legacy of this team is winners and that's a start of a journey." This so happened to be true, with the influx of attendances of Barclay's WSL games, as well as more girl's teams being formed up and down the country to allow more people to have the opportunity to get involved in the sport. The 2022 win really did inspire an entire nation but the main questions are: Can they go and do it again? Can they really bring football home again?



Reflection of Lana Del Rey's Stadium Tour

In June/July 2025, Lana Del Rey made her Great Britian and Northern Irish touring comeback, performing in Cardiff, Glasgow, Liverpool, Dublin and twice at Wembley. While fans were hoping this tour would come in response to her new unreleased album, that was expected to be released on 21st May, it was still a joy to see her performing in stadiums up and down the country. She sang her hit singles, in addition to new unreleased songs like Stars Fell on Alabama/Husband of Mine, Quiet in the South and 57.5, which was first debuted at the Stagecoach festival in April 2025, where she notably mentioned Morgan Wallen, advising listeners that 'if [they] want the secret to success, [she] suggests not going ATVing with him when [they're] out West'.

Del Rey also sung some of her most well renowned songs, including Born to Die, Video Games, Summertime Sadness, Ultraviolence, Ride, Henry, Come On and Chemtrails Under the Country Club.

On her 4th of July Wembley show, many were expecting her to sing the National Anthem, especially as it is rooted in the aesthetic of Americana. In the music video that was filmed in 2012, viewers watch as Del Rey intertwines the narratives of Marilyn Monroe and Jackie Kennedy, with A\$AP Rocky playing the President. She conveys the idea of a lavish family. At the end of the video, she has a monologue inspired by a letter Jackie Kennedy wrote about her husband, ending the video with the sentiment 'and I loved him, I loved him, I loved him. And I still love him', highlighting how love was at the heart of the Kennedy Administration, despite JFK's duty to his country.

However, rather than singing the anticipated National Anthem, Del Rey performed If You Lie Down With Me for the first time ever from her 9th studio album Blue Banisters.

Del Rey also had a range of openers, from London Grammar in Cardiff, Banks in Liverpool, Glasgow and Dublin, and upcoming Addison Rae for both of her Wembley shows. She also brought Rae out during both Wembley performances, with the pair singing Rae's Diet Pepsi on $3^{\rm rd}$ July and then 57.5 on $4^{\rm th}$.

Despite general opinion being that Del Rey's performance was moving and evoked an immense amount of emotion, many believe that the set list should've included a variety of more of her discography. Del Rey has (soon to be ten) nine studio albums: Born to Die, Paradise, Ultraviolence, Honeymoon, Lust for Life, NFR, Chemtrails Over the Country Club, Blue Banisters and Did you know that there's a tunnel under Ocean Blvd? Many expected that she would sing hits from Honeymoon and Lust for Life, as well as different hits from NFR, like California and The Greatest. However, it is important to consider that many of Del Rey's lyrics explore issues like addiction, domestic violence and toxic relationships. For example, last year when singing Chemtrails Over the Country Club, Del Rey adapted her lyrics 'he's born in December and I'm born in June', adding on 'he's born in December and he got married when we were in couple's therapy together', referencing her explosive breakup with Sean Larkin. This is vital to consider when reflecting on her performances, especially as she got married in September last year to alligator tour guide Jeremy Dufrene. In her first show in Cardiff, Del Rey got upset and went to Dufrene for consolidation, when she later apologised to audiences, saying that her emotion was because it was her first big time performing since she got married. She has even altered lyrics during her live performances to make them about Dufrene, most notably changing Chemtrails to 'he's born in March and I'm born in June'.

She also received a lot of criticism for using holograms of herself to perform Arcadia and do a spoken version of Tropico while she went backstage to change, with many saying that she shouldn't have done it. While criticism is expected of any artist performing, especially in a stadium, Lana Del Rey should be praised for her shows, and fans should be happy for her, especially in light of her recent marriage. She has overcome a lot recently, with criticisms being constantly made where her appearance is targeted and rumours about Dufrene's political views being attacked and assumed. In the words of Del Rey herself, she will always be a 'living legend'.

Dear Oscar Wilde,


