PD Day 1 – Wednesday 8 October

All of our students will be participating in their first Personal Development Day on Wednesday 8 October.

In Year 7, students will be learning about the importance of relationships and sex educations, familiarising themselves with Unifrog - a fantastic resource that highlights the pathways required to secure their dream job, exploring a range of online safety methods and celebrating modern languages.

In Year 8, students will be exploring the importance of voting and free & fair elections, exploring their future job options through Unifrog, celebrating modern languages by producing resources to use in their language classrooms and exploring ways to improve their mental wellbeing during challenging experiences.

In Year 9, students will be identifying their key interests to further refine their options for career choices, exploring how to keep themselves safe during an emergency, developing their own personal budgets and exploring the importance of sticking to one, as well as the risks of location sharing.

In Year 10, students will be reflecting on their relationships and sex education so far in PD, constructing meaningful CVs to aid them in applying to jobs, exploring different types of financial advice, as well as understanding how the algorithm influences our online activities.

In Year 11, students will explore what a hate crime is and why they are not tolerated in the UK, explore different revision methods and create a revision timetable centred around balancing their school work and personal lives, exploring the importance of the 'Flag Protests' across the UK and the symbolism behind it, as well as exploring the use of Al and how it influences our individual liberties.

Our Year 12 students will be taking an educational visit to explore University life and the options that await them with a university education.

Our Year 13 students will be taking part in a UCAS masterclass with their tutors, exploring techniques to handle examination stress, as well as analysing the important aspects of a healthy relationship.



Careers Fair

Last term, we held our annual careers fair here at SRPA, which Mrs Mather and our SSLT worked together to organise and run. Every year, different people, from different organisations come into the Academy to advertise their roles and promote their businesses, passing on knowledge they have gained from their work.

Our students experience our careers fair in their year groups. When they arrive, they are all handed a support sheet to complete to encourage them to speak to the various companies. This helps students to engage with the fair and learn valuable skills from the visiting organisations.

We were lucky enough to have spoken to a couple of the companies and talked to them about their journey, including people from our own NHS: the NHS representatives recommended a university pathway with access to a healthcare course, as a post-18 destination. From their own experience, they feel that this is the best way in. The minimum grade expectations for the course they offered was B, B, C so it is achievable. Candidates must demonstrate good transferable skills such as teamwork, communication and good hand-eye coordination and were advised that "there can be a lot of pressure at times, but it's the most rewarding job."

Also, we were privileged to have representatives from the Environment Agency who advised that there are no specific qualifications needed (although it may help). They recommended having either a relevant qualification or some work experience to get yourself ahead, as this is how they got selected!

The role is very hands-on and requires key skills such as problem-solving and time management – useful skills in a risk-centred environment. They could also be needed across the country, to areas which are not easily accessed!

This really highlights the benefits of our careers fayre here at SRPA, and with the help of Mrs Mather and our RP6th team, we can keep providing these opportunities

Safer Internet Day 2025

Reaching more children, young people, parents and carers than ever before!



57% of UK children aged 8-17 heard about Safer Internet Day

As a result of the day, young people:

- 76% felt more confident about what to do if something is worrying them online
- 57% talked to their parent or carer about how to stay safe on the internet
- 79% learnt something new about online safety
- 34% spoke to their parent or carer about something or someone that had been worrying them online
- 28% talked to someone about their experiences online that they had not spoken about before
- 43% spoke to someone about online scams

50% of UK parents and carers heard about Safer Internet Day (up from 32% in 2024!)

As a result of the day, parents and carers:

- 77% talked to their child about using the internet safely
- 71% feel better prepared to keep their child safe online
- 69% felt more confident about what to do if their child came to them with a problem they had online
- 72% understand more about how to keep their child safe online
- 73% are more aware of the impact online scams can have on their child
- 34% said their child spoke to them about something that had been worrying them online

What happened on the day

- #SaferInternetDay trended at no.1 throughout the day on X, with thousands of organisations and schools sharing their celebrations on the day using the #SaferInternetDay hashtag
- Over 86,000 young people tested their online safety knowledge with our quizzes
- Over 1,726 organisations across the UK signed up as official supporters of the day

Educational resources

To celebrate Safer Internet Day we created a range of free resources for those working with young people – including lesson plans, assemblies, quizzes and more. These resources were downloaded over 160,000 times and our survey of teachers found:

- 80% said that Safer Internet Day helped staff feel more confident about dealing with online safety issues
- 58% said Safer Internet Day led to concerns being raised about potential safeguarding issues online
- 96% said young people are more aware about potential risks and pressures when using the internet as a result of the day
- 96% said they enhanced young people's learning about something new
- 100% of educators would recommend participating in the Safer Internet Day campaign to others

Young people's involvement

Young people have been involved across every stage of the Safer Internet Day 2025 campaign. After hearing that scams were a main area that young people of all ages wanted more support with, we chose scams as the theme for 2025, and ran focus groups with young people to help shape the theme further.

Young people continued to be at the heart of the activities on the day itself, with young people delivering quizzes and activities, presenting keynote speeches and networking with policy makers from all sectors, including the technology industry and government, at the BT Tower. Young people also had the chance to share their thoughts with Baroness Jones of Whitchurch, Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State at DSIT.

The UK Safer Internet Centre also hosted events with MPs at Westminster, as well as working with Liverpool Football Club at an event for young people from local schools.

Safer Internet Day 2025 research

We launched new research focused on young people's experience of conversations around online safety. Our survey of more than 2,000 young people and 2,000 parents and carers found that:

- 79% of 8 to 17-year-olds come across online scams at least monthly, with 20%, including children as young as 8, seeing scams online every day
- Almost half of 8 to 17-year-olds (46%) have been scammed online and 9%, including 8-year-olds, have lost money to an online scam before
- Almost a fifth of 8 to 17-year-olds (18%) know someone their age who has lost money to an online scam
- Over a quarter (26%) of young people who've been scammed online blame themselves
- 74% of 8 to 17-year-olds want to learn more about how to spot scams online.
- 81% of parents and carers and 43% of teens feel that online scams are getting more convincing
- 32% of young people worry that the use of new technology, such as gen AI, will
 make scams much harder to identify
