Reading Bulletin 2025
Term 2

Welcome and Overview

Welcome to the first Reading Bulletin for this academic year. Since the end of the summer term, we have begun the year with our annual visit from the Scholastic Book Fair, paired up some of our members of RP6th with KS3 students as part of our Reading Buddies programme and continued involvement with Drop Everything and Read, encouraging students to engage with books they enjoy on a weekly basis during R2L time.



In this edition you will find information about 'The Year of Reading'; approaches to encouraging reading; supporting reading using Reading Plus; a featured section with reading recommendations from our English subject champions; an overview of upcoming reading events, both nationally and locally; and an update from our librarians.

The Book Fair

The Scholastic Book Fair returned for its annual visit this November. The library was abuzz at social times throughout the week with students looking at some of the latest releases in teen fiction alongside some classics. Students took home 'wish lists' of books for approval and purchase before returning to collect them the following day. Our top library borrowers were also given vouchers to be able to redeem against a book of their choice.



In total, we had 43 books purchased and have been able to claim over £90 to be spent on further stock for the library. As usual, we will consider our list of student requests when we come to ordering in this new stock. We hope the students enjoyed the opportunity to visit the Book Fair and look forward to its return again before Christmas next year!

The Year of Reading

In July of this year, the Department for Education and the National Literacy Trust joined forces to announce the launch of a National Year of Reading, starting in January 2026, to kick-start a reading revolution. It aims to reverse the trend of lower reading rates in young people as just one in three aged 8 to 18 said they enjoyed reading in their free time in 2025. The theme is 'Go All In' - inspiring people across the nation to discover that whatever they're passionate about, there's a book for it. Whether that be football, music, gaming or something else entirely, we want to help them dive deeper through reading.

While the benefits of reading might be well-known - expanding your world, sharpening your mind, helping to develop your creativity and successfulness - increasingly, fewer of us are making time to read. With so many forms of entertainment at our fingertips, reaching for a book doesn't always feel like the most natural or engaging form of entertainment. However, the National Year of Reading aims to change that.

The DfE and National Literacy Trust believe reading is a powerful plug-in to the things you already love – a great way to go deeper into your existing passions. Put simply we say: ‘if you’re into it, read into it’. They’re asking the nation to Go All In and see how reading in all its forms can unlock more of what you love – whether it’s music, baking, family time, films, sci-fi or... anything.

FAQs related to supporting reading

Do you have a reluctant reader?

Following our previous tips in the previous two Bulletins (which are available on the Academy website), here are some further tips that may prove useful in engaging and supporting your reluctant reader:

Tip 11: Let your children see you reading for pleasure and talk about how you choose books. It can be inspiring for them to see you engaging in reading and encourage them to consider their own habits.

Tip 12: Set ambitious but realistic Reading Plus targets for your child: can they get to 100,000 words read by Easter? Can they complete four combos scoring over 80% on their quizzes in two weeks? Or can they level up again by half-term? It can be motivating to work towards a target and then celebrate its achievement.

Tip 13: Continue to read aloud to your children (even if they are fluent readers). You might read until you get to a cliff-hanger in the story, and then say you need to do something urgent but they can read on...

Tip 14: Visit a bookstore and allow your child to select a book of their choice. The visually appealing marketing and layout of best-selling books can attract even reluctant readers. Waterstones on the High Street is packed with books to suit tastes in different genres along with thematic displays. Don't forget independent book sellers such as Lindum Books too!

Tip 15: If fiction doesn't seem to appeal, try biographies/autobiographies that interest your child. Recent student favourites have been *You Can Do It* by Rashford and *Becoming Muhammed Ali* by Patterson & Alexander.

Reading with Reading Plus – for KS3 parents

Reading Plus is tailored to each student and their reading skills and adapts to continue to develop their overall reading comprehension and fluency and their vocabulary understanding. As part of their homework within English, students are expected to complete 3 or 4 books a week to support this progress and development of skills. Students are given a book to read with a guided window to help develop their text tracking ability before being asked a set of comprehension questions about the text. To help your child to make progress with Reading Plus you could encourage them to:

- Engage fully and track the text with the window rather than allowing their mind to wander
- Use the 're-read' function if they need it (and it is available) while answering the questions as it can save them from getting an answer wrong
- Aim to complete 'combos' by achieving over 80% on consecutive books as this allows them to level-up and access new books


Book Recommendations for Students:

This term, we have asked our English Subject Champions to provide recommendations for lower years based on their reading experiences as they moved through secondary school themselves.




The Wind in the Willows by Kenneth Grahame

An enchanting portal to another world of mystery, deception and wonder. Set between our world and an alternate reality, follow the adventures of Lyra and Will in search of answers.




The Selection by Kiera Cass

Like the *Hunger Games* but about a girl who has to perform in trials to marry the prince, except it goes wrong and politics becomes too far involved.



The Bunker Diary by Kevin Brooks. Best suited to those in KS4

A dark read focusing on the experiences of a homeless 15-year-old who ends up being taken off the streets by an unknown figure as he tries to survive along with five others.



The Fault in our Stars by John Green.

A story that follows Hazel, a teen who has been diagnosed with terminal thyroid cancer who falls for a boy, Gus, in her cancer support group. Linked by their love of books, Gus and Hazel set out on an adventure.



The Ruling Class by Jennifer Lynn Barnes.

A fiery teen, Tess, moves to Washington D.C. to live with her sister – a known 'fixer' for powerful and well-connected people. Immersed in scandals and secrets through her sister's lifestyle, Tess becomes a high school 'fixer' at the elite Hardwicke School.

Book Recommendations for Parents/Carers

Whilst looking to support your child with reading at home, you may wish to consider your next read. Some of our staff have provided recommendations for other staff or older readers, which are below.

Pride and Prejudice by Jane Austen. Filled with sharp wit, compelling characters and insightful social satire, this is a timeless masterpiece that is more than just a love story.

My Brilliant Friend by Elena Ferrante. Set in a Neapolitan neighbourhood in the mid-20th Century, this story follows the intense friendship between two childhood friends with all the ups and downs they encounter along the way.

Fahrenheit 451 by Ray Bradbury. A modern classic dystopian novel that highlights the importance of understanding the information around us, how it is presented to us and the dangers of censorship.


Hamnet by Maggie O'Farrell. A historical novel inspired by the son of the Bard, William Shakespeare. It centres around the family and living in Elizabethan England and the reimagining of a boy and his experiences that have all but been forgotten.

The Letters From an Unknown Woman by Stefan Zweig. A tragic tale of a nameless woman who writes a letter recounting a lifetime of unrequited love while showing what love is not.

SRPA Library:

As we have started a new year, we have had an update in library stock based on student requests! Students can pop down to the library to have a look and take these out on a two-week loan. Students can also log in to AccessIt, our library catalogue service, to see if we have a book they are interested in borrowing and can reserve a copy prior to popping down.

If students are unsure about what they want to read, we have recommended reading booklists arranged by genre that feature on the Library Frog (our VLE) page. There are separate lists available for KS3, KS4 and KS5. Similarly, form tutors have access to recommended book lists suited for each year group in terms of topics that they can share with their forms during DEAR time.

If a student is still unsure what to choose, either Mrs White, Mrs Lakin or Mrs Murdoch would be willing to help!

Our librarians have also both taken time to share a little about themselves and their current reading interests and habits.

Art, Design and Technology

As we reflect on a busy and productive term for our faculty. Firstly, I would like to celebrate the outstanding summer results achieved across all our Key Stage 4 subjects. We are incredibly proud that our students attained an average grade of 5.2 across five subjects and specifications. This achievement is a testament to the hard work of our students, families and staff. I extend my heartfelt congratulations to everyone involved.

Since September, our Year 11 and Year 13 students have been diligently working to complete their Non-Examined Assessments (NEAs) to the highest possible standards. Engineering, Art and Photography are nearing the completion of their NEAs and are preparing for their final examinations in the new year. Meanwhile, Hospitality and Catering, along with Design Technology, will begin their practical assessments in February.

Our Year 10 and Year 12 students have also made a strong start, developing their foundational understanding in their new optional courses. It is a pleasure to witness their enthusiasm and engagement, which is supported by our well-planned and sequenced Key Stage 3 schemes of learning.


In Key Stage 3, our students have been actively engaged in Art, Design and Technology, as well as Food and Nutrition. For those who have been with us for some time, you may have noticed that we have begun reporting Food as a separate subject, providing valuable insights into individual strengths. We hope that the funding for materials and ingredients alleviates any last-minute shopping for practical lessons, ensuring a smoother experience for everyone involved.



Our faculty meetings have been utilised in various ways this term, focusing on enhancing the delivery of our practical subjects. Our staff members have been collaborating to improve the quality of teaching across different specialisms. For instance, Mr Palethorpe conducted a session on Computer-Aided Design (CAD), Mr Webster supported staff in wood-based practicals, and Mrs Hodson shared her expertise and science knowledge in creating high-quality products like blancmange and mayonnaise.



Business and Computing



As part of our ongoing commitment to fostering collaboration and peer support among students, Year 12 and Year 13 Business & Computing students participated in a team building trip to a local mini golf venue.

The activity was designed to encourage teamwork, communication, and the development of soft skills, in a relaxed and enjoyable setting.

Students were grouped into mixed teams, allowing them to interact with peers from different subjects and year groups. Throughout the course, they demonstrated excellent collaboration, problem solving, and leadership as they navigated the challenges of each hole. The informal environment provided a valuable opportunity for students to build connections beyond the classroom, strengthening their sense of community and mutual support.


KS3 Games Club

Year 7 students are using GDevelop to create 2D pixel arcade style games. During Term 1, they completed introductory tutorials to become familiar with the software package and during Term 2, are working through a series of tutorials that will guide them through creating a side-scrolling space shooter game using pre-prepared assets. The first game is expected to be completed by Easter before students use their skills to create a 2D platforming game with a theme of their choice. The Year 8 subject champions are providing technical support to their fellow students, having been part of the club last year.

In the first two weeks of November, Key Stage 3 Computing students took part in a national competition on computational problem-solving held by the Raspberry Pi Foundation.

Students were asked a total of 15 questions of various difficulties relating to Computer Science based topics.

The top 10%, along with the best in school awards, will be handed out in the new year after the results have been published by Raspberry Pi.

Geography

GCSE Geography Fieldwork – Tuesday 11th November 2025

As part of their GCSE course, the Year 10 and Year 11 Geography students went on a fieldtrip to the Holderness coastline to investigate erosion in the town of Hornsea. The Holderness is the fastest eroding coastline in Europe therefore, this was a very suitable location. Students used equipment like clinometers to measure the gradient of beaches as well as conducting a sediment analysis.

Students completed the fieldwork by conducting a bipolar analysis of the different sea defences that are in place to protect Hornsea. Overall, the trip gave students lots of useful data that they used to help complete their write up of the investigation and the day finished with a visit to the fish and chip shop where students were praised by the locals for how polite and well-mannered they were!




Geography Fieldwork - Tuesday 25th November 2025

The A-Level Geography students went on a field trip to the Holderness Coast in Yorkshire to observe the erosion taking place at Flamborough Head and Hornsea. This supported their knowledge of the Coasts topic and also provided fieldwork and data analysis skills to support in the NEA unit.

Students used equipment like clinometers to measure the gradient of beaches and the height of cliffs to create beach and cliff profiles to show the difference between both locations. Students were also able to evaluate the coastal management of Hornsea by seeing the drastic difference between protected and unprotected beaches in the fastest eroding coastline in Europe.

Overall, it was an enjoyable day out with very little rain, and food from a fish and chips restaurant at the end of it!



English

This term has been busy for English students in the Academy, who continue to show a great aptitude for all we throw at them! In Year 7, our students have completed the transition novel, *Stormbreaker*, by the award-winning novelist Anthony Horowitz, which is a story about a young teenage spy called Alex Rider, who deals in danger and secrets on a daily basis. In Year 8, students have been working on dystopian fiction, and have considered terrifying technology, evil tyrannical rulers and moral conundrums: perfect reading as the nights draw in and the weather becomes gloomy!



In Year 9, students have spent the first term on a novel called *My Name is Leon*, a story about a young boy growing up in 1980s Birmingham, before switching focus to the moral play *Twelve Angry Men*, which looks at the important role of jurors and justice in American society.

Elsewhere, Year 10 have been studying their nineteenth century text – either *Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde* by Robert Louis Stevenson or *A Christmas Carol* by Charles Dickens – as part of their GCSE Literature, whilst getting to grips with the requirements of Language Paper 1: Fiction. They are making great progress and have adapted well to the challenges of Key Stage 4.

Year 11 students have likewise completed their modern text for Literature – either *An Inspector Calls* or *A Woman in Black* – and, more recently, Unseen Poetry. Focus has now switched to preparations for mock examinations in January. The English Department has also started running revision on a weekly basis for Year 11, alternating between Literature and Language. This has worked exceptionally well for our students, who are able to plan and organise their time effectively.



In Year 12, our A Level Literature students have studied the novel *Rebecca* and poetry entitled *Love Through the Ages*, whilst our A Level Language students have considered the importance of Accent and Dialect across England. Year 13 are, like Year 11, preparing for their mock examinations in January, all the while working hard on their NEAs (Non-Examined Assessments)—the end is well and truly coming into view!

Science

Year 8 take to the Skies!

A team of 11 Year 8 students took part in an eggciting engineering competition at RAF Waddington, bringing their own zipline-launched aircraft to life. After weeks of design, wiring, and coding, the team's model successfully deployed two egg-drop capsules mid-flight; a feat of precision electronics and creative aerodynamics, even if the 'eggs' didn't quite make the target this time!

The event began with a 'Dragon's Den' style pitch, where each school presented their engineering process to RAF engineers and industry judges. Our students explained their aircraft design, the custom control electronics they had built, and the teamwork that brought it all together.

Beyond the competition, the day was packed with STEM experiences. Pupils tried their hand at drone flying with members of the RAF Model Aircraft Association, took a virtual flight in a Lancaster Bomber thanks to the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight team, and joined a LEGO Spike robotics challenge, designing, building and coding a robot capable of carrying out a remote rescue in a simulated disaster zone.

The trip celebrated the creativity and problem-solving that sit at the heart of science and engineering. We had a cracking time and our students came away inspired, confident and made the academy proud.




Science

Since Term 1, students have already earned over 6,400 house points through this new format, which is an outstanding achievement.



Pupils will also learn about their carbon footprint and the cost of various products (including trainers and more) to the environment.


House Values

For those requiring support and intervention, an electronic tracking system has been created where staff and parents can easily monitor student performance, see patterns in behaviour and areas of strength and weakness.




Gone are the days of lost or empty report cards! The new system is still in its infancy but a much more holistic and collaborative approach can now be taken with regards to A2L support. At the end of half term 1, students' A2L was assessed with the results displayed below. Following this assessment, students were given the opportunity to reflect on their A2L and set targets for improvement.



Anti-Bullying

This term, we have continued to strengthen our approach to anti-bullying across the academy. Staff have received additional training and a new group of Anti-Bullying Ambassadors has been established. Meeting weekly, these students have been exploring the impact of bullying and developing strategies to support their peers.



All students in Years 7–11 have attended assemblies using Just Like Us resources, which explained what bullying is and the effects it can have on victims, perpetrators, and witnesses. In addition, a monthly update now reviews the house incident log, ensuring that repeat concerns are highlighted to house teams and followed up with targeted interventions. Together, these steps are helping us to build a safer, kinder school environment.

Pride

Our PROUD Club continues to thrive, meeting every Tuesday during Break 1 in T15. The club alternates between structured sessions and discussion-based activities, led by both staff and student leaders.

Sessions have included learning about the meaning of different pride flags, with members receiving pride badges for their blazers to celebrate their involvement.

Craft activities have also provided opportunities for informal conversations around gender, sexual identities and the impact of homophobia on young people. Insights from these discussions were shared more widely through our anti-bullying assemblies, ensuring that the values of respect and inclusion reach the whole school community.

Peer Mentoring

This year's peer mentoring programme has been a real highlight across the school. It has been wonderful to see students supporting one another with such enthusiasm, patience and kindness. Our mentors have shown impressive leadership skills, while mentees have grown in confidence as they build positive, trusting relationships with their peers. The sense of community this has created has been noticeable in their sessions as well as around the school.

We are incredibly proud of the students involved. To further strengthen the programme, we have introduced mentoring sheets that help structure each session and provide more advanced support. These sheets guide students through goal setting, reflection and problem-solving activities, ensuring that every meeting is focused, purposeful and tailored to individual needs. Early feedback suggests that the added structure has helped both mentors and mentees make even more progress this term.

We look forward to seeing the programme continue to grow and to celebrating the many successes still to come.

Ready to Learn (R2L) Programme

This term, our Ready 2 Learn programme offered students a wide range of opportunities to develop their knowledge, skills, and personal growth. Weekly assemblies focused on important themes such as stress awareness for KS4 students, remembrance day, anti-bullying and human rights. We concluded with our Star of the Term assembly, celebrating those who demonstrated exceptional effort in each class.

Alongside assemblies, students engaged in cultural capital activities including keeping up to date with current news, enjoying reading for pleasure through Drop Everything And Read sessions, monitoring their own behaviour and attendance data, taking part in a weekly quiz and exploring opportunities highlighted in the student bulletin and Job of the Week feature.

This term's Jobs of the Week introduced students to a variety of careers including sound engineer, talent agent, utility manager, veterinary nurse, writer and yacht deckhand.

A new addition to the programme this year is Tutor Pastoral Intervention, which takes place during assemblies. This allows tutors to take individual students out for one-to-one conversations about topics such as behaviour, motivation, or any worries they might have. These sessions have widened our reach for pastoral care and given tutors valuable time to build stronger relationships with their students, ensuring that individual needs are supported effectively.

We are proud of the enthusiasm and commitment shown by our students and look forward to continuing these enriching experiences next term.

SRPA Hosts - The Schools MACE

Earlier this term we hosted the prestigious first round of The Schools Mace debating competition. We welcomed 5 other schools from across the East Midlands for a night of topical debate.

Round one focused on the impact a tourist tax can have on cities and economies more locally, with students focusing on Bourton on the Water and Barcelona as part of their explanations.

Secondly, our pupils were tasked with debating the motion “This House Would Ban Short Haul Domestic Flights”. Our Pupils, Tabitha P, Esmee J and our Team Captain Jamie S debated extraordinarily with Jamie even getting a special mention for his closing speech which the judge called “revolutionary and worthy of Parliament”.

Firstly, Tabitha outlined the impact of flights on the environment but also highlighted the impact of racial profiling on individuals going through airport security. She explained how the domestic flight market is unsustainable and why drastic change is needed. Esmee then challenged the opposition and argued that often domestic flights take more time than other more reliable modes of transportation. Finally, Jamie closed the evening discussing the duty our current generation has on tackling climate change once and for all.

The last debate of the evening focused on relationship-based reality television with pupils assessing the impact of mental health and the negative side effects that shows like Love Island can have on young people.

Despite an exceptional performance, our pupils very narrowly missed out on qualifying for the next round. However, as hosts we are able to observe the final in London during the summer term. With many more debating competitions to go this year, we are excited that our team has grown so significantly and look forward to bringing you debating news for the year ahead.

On Wednesday 3rd December, some of our Year 11 pupils had the pleasure of attending a question time debate hosted by North Kesteven District Council. This event gave students the opportunity to meet a selective panel of industry leaders from across Sleaford & North Hykeham including Cllr Richard Wright, Leader of NKDC. Chief inspector of Sleaford Police and the Dean of the University of Lincoln.

Debates centred around drug use in Sleaford with pupils learning about police strategies and opportunities to work with the local police, as well as the sustainability of farming and agriculture in the UK. Our pupils took part in various polls and engaged well with the debates on offer.
